Katie never could have imagined that music lessons and encouragement from family to try music would lead to starting a band during her freshman year of college and being able to perform at an on-campus philanthropy event.

Katie and her friends were able to play at a philanthropy event on campus called Bennett Jam. It was their first time playing for an audience together as a band and they played five songs.

"I had to play kind of quiet because we were in such a tight space, so that let me hear the other people more than I normally would. The drummer's normally in the back in a box so I generally don't get to hear what we sound like most of the time. "I've never done a spit take in my life, and I haven't since, I just didn't expect it to be as good as it was and so I was drinking water and he says his line and I just sent the water everywhere", said Spencer.
